# The People We Meet — Lessons in Compassion

Kitty Angels has been in existence for over 20 years. During that time our original intent has never changed: to help the cats that need assistance most – the strays and ferals. As we reach out to help these cats, we often encounter some very special people.

Many friendships have been formed over the years and we have come to care deeply for the people we have encountered along the way. Some of these people are generous, kind, brave and self-sufficient souls; people with happy homes and lives, and some are as lonely, abandoned or down-and-out as the needy cats we strive to help. All of these people have taught us lessons in love and compassion.

Let me tell you about a few memorable individuals:

We will never forget the homeless men under the bridge. In the dead cold of winter

they huddled around a fire trying to stay

warm. We had heard that they were there and that they had collected a group of homeless cats off of the city streets. These men were struggling to take care of themselves and the cats, but the cats were increasing in numbers and there simply was not enough for anyone to eat, man or feline. As we brought food for the cats we couldn't help noticing the longing in the men's eyes as they looked at the cats feasting on such an abundance of food. Realizing that the men were just as hungry, we began to make the bridge a regular stop, delivering food, warm blankets and jackets and collecting the cats to tend to them and find them permanent homes. Eventually the men were forced by the city to move from that location. How remarkable that these unfortunate men willingly shared their meager provisions with their collection of homeless cats – we often think of them and the lesson in compassion that they taught; we wish them well and will always wonder what became of each of them.

Ruthie is one of those rare individuals that anyone would be lucky to know. Now in her 80's, we first saw her pushing a heavily laden cart of cat food. Her diminutive size made her progress slow as she passed

by us while we were doing an adoption day at a pet store. As she was exiting the store we stopped her and asked how many cats she had. She cheerfully told us that she was feeding many homeless cats in the city of Lawrence. We took her phone number and promised that we would come and check things out. So began our involvement with that city and this incredibly kind woman who sacrificed her comforts for those of the homeless cats. Ruthie would venture into all sorts of neighborhoods to her feeding spots, bag of cat food, jug of water, and a special baggie of "chick-chick" -- rotisserie chicken -- in her arms. She would leave her basement windows open year-round so that the strays would have a warm and safe spot in which they could sleep. This bravehearted, compassionate woman has been a saving grace to so many living creatures in

need; cats, dogs, pigeons, squirrels, you name it and Ruthie has rescued it!

We can't forget to mention our dear friend, Pat, who has the most amazing heart for the cats and dogs whose lucky lives she has touched. We met Pat while trapping a kitten that became lost after jumping from a second story balcony. Pat was feeding several colonies of cats in the city of Lowell, each and every day, for years and years. She would start her day by picking up two dogs that lived in a junked car lot. She

would hoist the big dogs into her car and drive them to her feeding stations where they would sit while she delivered food and water to the grateful (and hungry) ferals and strays along her route. Pat had made sure that many of the ferals had been spayed and neutered; paying their medical bills out of her meager retirement checks. She was an "army of one" in a city whose stray and feral animal population desperately needed a friend. After her feeding rounds, Pat would take the dogs to the park and walk them, or to the vets office where, again, she would pay out of her own pocket to give these dogs any medical care that they needed. Then, she would sneak them home for the day and let them lay around her apartment while she prepared their meals. She followed this routine until, one day, the last of the two dogs, Scooby, no longer able to walk, was gently put to sleep. Although Pat is no longer able to make her rounds, we still speak with her on a regular basis. Kitty Angels has found homes for most of her cats. The few elderly and unadoptable cats that were left in her colonies are living in one of our foster homes. Pat's commitments to the animals in her life remind us that we are not alone in the struggle to make a difference.

On a routine visit to Lawrence to feed some feral cats, we met a group of young boys on the city streets. They were fascinated by the fact that we were feeding the stray cats and asked if they could pour the food into the bowls, wipe out the water dishes, carry the water jug, etc. These wonderful children were so very enthusiastic and asked when we would be back again so that they could help out. They told us how a few of them had started their own group called "The Animal Protec-

tors of Lawrence." One of the boys brought us a baby bird that had fallen from his nest, and later stood with tears running down his cheeks as we wrapped the deceased baby bird in a towel. They sometimes carried cans of food around with them in case they found a cat that "looked hungry." The boys called us early one morning because they had witnessed a cat get hit by a car during the night. They drew straws to see which one would pick up the "dead cat," but seeing that the cat was still alive, they brought it into one of the boy's homes. When we picked up the cat, she had a broken jaw and a bit of brain damage, but to this day she is alive and well, thanks to the Animal Protectors of Lawrence. Although the group has disbanded and Joel, the "President," has moved back to El Salvador, we will always remember the gentle and pure hearts of these young men.

We could go on and on. We have met the most amazing and wonderful people in our travels and there is simply not room enough to list everyone who has done kind deeds and gone the extra mile to help an animal in need. Many people set out food and water and provide shelter for stray animals, not knowing where to turn to get help. We are inspired by each and every one of you and we love your beautiful hearts. We couldn't do it without you!

The wonderful message is that compassionate people abound! We have learned so much about life on this journey and observed so many acts of kindness extended both to people and animals. We look forward to the new people and animals we will meet as the journey continues.

### Spencer's Story...a true story by a KA volunteer

A few months ago, the City of Lawrence, MA, received a call about a suspected cat hoarder who was keeping a large number of cats in a house in which she no longer lived. She was observed going to the house a few times a week to throw ripped bags of cat food on the floor from which the cats would eat. Spencer, a gorgeous flame-point Siamese mix with big trusting blue eyes, was one of the more than twenty cats living in this house. The conditions in the house were heartbreaking: the fleas were so bad that all of the cats were anemic; some even had heart murmurs from having lost so much blood to the fleas. Sadly, several cats had died. To make matters worse, when the owner heard that the Board of Health was planning an investigation, she threw all of the cats outdoors to fend for themselves!

Kitty Angels learned of these poor, abandoned, cats and, in cooperation with another rescue group, caught them one-by-one. Spencer was not as lucky as some of the other captured cats — after being spotted in an inaccessible and rotted-out crawl space, he disappeared for several weeks as the search for him continued. Then came the horrible news: Spencer had been seen several streets away, dragging his back legs behind him. When we found him he was hiding under a dumpster and would not come out — lying on her stomach, and just barely able to reach him with her fingertips, a KA volunteer was finally able to retrieve him.

Spencer was rushed to a 24-hour emergency veterinary hospital where we were told that the prognosis was not good. He was anemic, emaciated and dehydrated; he had three wounds of unknown origin that were infested with maggots; worst of all, Spencer had been hit by a car and had suffered a broken back and broken rib. The only good news was that he still had feeling in his back legs, so there was a slight chance for recovery. We chose to give Spencer the chance that he deserved and proceeding with intense, and very expensive, veterinary care.

Spencer was hospitalized for a week before going home into foster care. Restricted to cage rest for several weeks, Spencer made progress one small step at a time. Eventually, he was able to stand on his hind legs and use his litter box; he even comes to greet his "foster mom" at the door of "his bedroom" whenever she goes in to help with his physical therapy exercises. Spencer has become the sweetest, most lovable and appreciative guy around. He loves to be loved and showers us with loud purrs and head butts.

As you can imagine, Spencer's care was quite costly, but saving him is what KA is all about. There are so many cats out there like Spencer — cats whose daily suffering cannot be ameliorated without your donations. Please help and Thank You so very much!!!
